Easter Ruminations Fidelity in Lent

Lent is quickly coming to a close. During these difficult times it is very easy to lose our way as we continue our Lenten journey. Preparations for Easter Sunday can still be made.

The following thoughts may keep us on the right course. There are ten simple rules to follow: Love God, don't use bad language, go to church, be obedient, protect the sanctity of life, have a pure heart, give an honest day's work, tell the truth, be faithful, and never succumb to jealously.



These decrees are NOT suggestions. Therefore, abstain from truth debates as good and evil were established long ago. When necessary, learn to confront rather than compromise avoiding humanistic terms of endearment, entitlements, or victimology. Too often such descriptions weave a tapestry of despair.

Never forget those who love you. Always forgive those who have forgotten you. Fidelity is not an option. But only you can decide whether your promise to love, honor, and obey is worth the effort. Make peace with your neighbor. Love your spouse. Honor your father and mother and forgive your enemies.

Pray for the poor, the sick, the persecuted, those who live in war, and those who are dying a spiritual death. Learn to appreciate the simple things in life. A sunny day, a child's laugh, a flower's bloom, and a puppy's kiss are all reasons to be grateful for what you have been given. Don't take such blessings for granted.

Do not miss the opportunity to sow the seeds of happiness in this world because you are too busy, too engaged in your favorite sports team, or caught up in the outcome of another reality show. Avoid meditations on the mystery of life or why you are here. Trust in Him who has the answers.



Be prepared to enter your Garden of Gethsemane when you are on the brink of spiritual bankruptcy, or turn from the poor, the lonely, the confused, the sick, and those in despair. And should you find yourself complaining about the cross you are asked to carry, refuse to help others carry their cross, or worse yet, add further weight on those who are carrying a cross, don't expect your personal "Simon of Cyrene" to ease your burden.

Forgive those whose indifference and/or ignorance can lead to distraction or destruction. Be passionate in your advocacy for truth, justice, and love. Trust your Guardian Angel to warn against impending darkness. Never trust the minions of Hell who live in eternal darkness. Focus on your spiritual journey as you defend your beliefs while using your talents for the greater glory of God.

Do these things and you are well on your way to eternal happiness. For one day you will stand before almighty God and He will ask if you shared your blessings with others; how you invested your time; whether you were faithful to your obligations; what you stood for and against; and if you forgave those that trespassed against you.

How you answer then, is dependent on what you do now. And what you do in this world will determine what you will do in the next. And should you choose to follow the Blessed Mother's advice at Cana (John 2:5), you will one day hear the words,

"Well done good and faithful servant, for as you loved Me so have I loved you. Welcome home."

Let's listen carefully as we consider the Wisdom of Holy Scripture and Catechism. May God give to each one of us the necessary means to complete His Gift of our Unique and Holy Mission.





John 2:1-11 The First Miracle

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come."

His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim.

Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now."

Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs in Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.



Luke 23:36-43 Remember me

Even the soldiers jeered at him. As they approached to offer him wine they called out, "If you are King of the Jews, save yourself." Above him there was an inscription that read, "This is the King of the Jews."

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us." The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal."

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Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Jesus also prays for us - in our place and on our behalf. All our petitions were gathered up, once for all, in his cry on the Cross and, in his Resurrection, heard by the Father. I have made it a point to watch Mel Gibson's, The Passion of the Christ on more than a few occasions. Perhaps that's why the words, "remember me" represent not only what I ask of Jesus: But what the Son of God asks of me.
