Gospel Reflection

Reflecting on the scriptures

Today's gospel reading is the first one I remember paying attention to as a child. And that was because it offended my child's sense of fairness. Now that I am a grown-up it makes perfect sense.

What a difference in perspective comes from moving from a child's point of view to the point of view of an adult, or even, as in today's readings, to God's point of view: "As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high on my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts." (Isaiah)

The child in us, like the workers hired first in the gospel, equates reward with effort and assumes that everyone starts in the same place. But when land owners go out to hire workers they find laborers who are not all the same. Some are younger than others, some stronger than others. Those will be the workers hired first. The landowner in today's gospel on his last trip hires those who have been passed over all day.

When it comes time to pay his workers the owner of the vineyard chooses to look at what his workers need to feed their families, not the hours they have worked. Those who have worked all day get rewarded with a full day's pay as agreed upon. They are not treated unjustly. But they complain when the owner of the vineyard looks with mercy upon those who have not been able to work as long, despite having looked for work all day.

Parents of several children realize how wise the owner of the vineyard is. They do not treat each of their children exactly the same, because the children are not exactly the same. They each need different things in order to thrive. The wisdom in this approach is probably not appreciated until those children have children of their own.

The implications for our civic life are obvious. We do not all start in the same place, for a variety of reasons. Maybe we are new to this country, having come here to seek a better life, but struggle with a new language and new ways. Maybe the schools in our neighborhood have not equipped us for success. Maybe we have not been hired or promoted for reasons that do not have to do with the quality of our work.

To treat each other with the love and mercy that God shows to us is a challenge. Indeed, our ways are not naturally God's ways. But it is a challenge we are called to take up if we are serious about the reign of God.

Cleveland Church Tour

Friday, November 3, 2023

In the early 20th century, immigrants from southern and eastern Europe and the Middle East settled in the Cleveland area. These immigrants built many houses of worship. A Local Guide will teach us the history of some of the churches between visits of these architectural masterpieces.

Package Features:

- **Motorcoach Transportation** – Depart St. Hilary Church at 8:15 AM and return about 5:30 PM
- **Tour of Cleveland with a Local Tour Guide** as we travel between churches.
- **St. Stephen Roman Catholic Church Tour (pictured right)** – tour, time for questions, answers and to see the grounds. Built in 1875 and added into the National Register of Historic Places in 1977, this church was founded due to the need for a second German parish on the west side of Cleveland.
- **Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist Tour (pictured above)** – tour, Mass – This historic Roman Catholic Church was completed in 1852. Large numbers of Catholics arrived in the Western Reserve in the 1830's creating the need for the cathedral when the Diocese was established in 1847.
- **West Side Market or Neighboring Restaurants** – Purchase lunch – The market is a Cleveland icon that celebrated 100 years at its current location and is the oldest operating market in Cleveland. Since opening across the street from its current location in 1840, most residents of the neighborhood and many Clevelanders do a large portion of their shopping at the market. There will be time to shop, browse and purchase lunch.
- **St. Patrick Church (pictured middle right)** – This is the oldest Irish Gothic Church on the west side. The cornerstone for the original church was placed in 1871. The stained glass windows are as amazing as the structure.
- **St. Ignatius Church (pictured right)** – Built in the early 1900's, this is another architectural masterpiece located on the west side of Cleveland. Fr Steve asserts that this church is a "unique example of Egyptian Romanesque Architecture ... truly one of a kind!"

Separation of Church and State was crafted to **protect the Church** from government interference, not to keep her silent. The Church's right to speak out on social issues is fully protected. You have a right to know how Issue 1, a proposed amendment to the state constitution to be voted on Nov 7, 2023, will effect your future. Despite what proponents claim, the legal language chosen for **the amendment would have rippling and reverberating consequences** for every Ohioan, **especially regarding parental rights and notification**. It will take away power of the state to protect the innocent and give protection to sex abusers and abortionists, and make abortion legal up to the moment of birth. More info to follow!

WHERE DOES IT SAY THAT?



THIS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT...

THREATENS PARENTAL RIGHTS

By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

PUTS WOMEN AT RISK

Current Ohio laws* require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

ALLOWS ABORTIONS THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY

In U.S. law,** "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortion-providing physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

IS MISLEADING

Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals have always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.

ARTICLE I, SECTION 22

*The Right to Reproductive Freedom
with Protections for Health and Safety*

1. Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
3. However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
4. As used in this Section, "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and "State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.
5. This Section is self-executing.
