


Fourth Sunday of Easter

We are three weeks into this Easter Season...usually a time of rejoicing with alleluias and spring flowers, with white vestments and joyful hymns.

But this year, the lens through which we view our world is skewed, darkened by this deadly virus. Its trail of death and destruction, impacting every segment of our lives, bears grim witness to what is happening and gets in the way of Easter joy.

What solace can we find in our Easter Scriptures? Perhaps this year they are speaking to us in new ways, reminding us that there is life after death, joy after suffering, healing after pain.

Listening to the **Acts of the Apostles**, we might be inspired by their enthusiasm for spreading the Gospel. Perhaps we can't preach, teach, heal and baptize as they did, but we can reach out in many other ways to vulnerable people, using phones, texts, emails, the postal service, Zoom meetings (etc.) to communicate. We are called to reach out—through whatever means at our disposal—to embrace those who bear the wounds of this unique crucifixion.



As we face another week of living this new way of life, let us be consoled and encouraged by some of the words from today's Scriptures.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS Recognizing the Voice of Jesus

When my wireless provider introduced HD Voice, the voice I heard on my phone was unbelievably clear, and it felt at times like both the caller and I were in the same room. The best aspect of this feature is that it didn't cost the customer any additional fees, and it didn't require any changes to the phone. I could say it was free, but I suspect I was already paying for it in my monthly bill anyway. At least it felt free.

The clearer the voice calling you, the easier it is to recognize who it is on the other end of the line. In John's Gospel, Jesus speaks of the gatekeeper who opens the gate and calls for his sheep. They respond because they know his voice. Others try to lure the sheep when the gatekeeper is not there, but the sheep find their voices unclear or unfamiliar.

Jesus is our gatekeeper. But unlike receiving something for free from a wireless company, to be able to hear his voice we need to pay attention and practice listening. By developing a stewardship way of life that is mindful and prayerful, we become attuned to his voice and are able to discern when the call is from our Lord and when it is from an imposter. It is great to talk about all the things we can do and all the gifts we can share, but if we are not listening for his call to hear where our offerings are needed, we can end up like a lost sheep searching for the gatekeeper.



"Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thank sgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Iesus." (Philippians 4:6)

Our Father loves us deeply, cares about our concerns right down to the hairs on our heads (Matthew 10:30). He urges us to respond well to a world we can't control. If we let him, God will enable us to learn and grow

through our experiences, no matter how overwhelming or unpleasant.

Why does God let us suffer?

God wills our good. It is not God's will that we suffer. The ways of the world aren't always in harmony with his will. However, his plan for us will bring us the ultimate good. He loves us with true love and wants us prepped and ready for Heaven.

God doesn't make evil. What we see as evil in the world, God can use for good. When we cooperate with him,

suffering becomes meaningful, struggle worthwhile, victory affirming, and even the acceptance of what we cannot overcome life-giving, as they were for

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics call Pentecost the "birthday of the Church?" Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance"

(Acts 2:4).

On the feast of Pentecost, the Apostles were in the Upper Room where they held the Passover with Jesus, All of a sudden, the Holv Spirit descended on the Apostles in the form of wind and fire. "And they were all filled with the Holy

Then the Apostles were emboldened and rushed out to preach the Gospel and baptized 3,000 people. We call this the "birthday" of the Church because this is the day when the Holy Spirit made the Church visible to the world.

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
Jesus understands

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). It is astounding to think that in his human nature, Jesus experienced fear and suffering, just like we do. Even better, he wants to help.

Fear. Early in his life, soldiers hunted him down to kill him. His neighbors threatened him with harm when they didn't like his teaching. He endured a horrific Passion. Jesus coped by relying on prayer, grace, and confidence in his Father's will. He showed us how so we can endure, as well.

Suffering. During his crucifixion, Jesus became sick, dehydrated, and exhausted as his body began to shut down. Once on the Cross, it became harder and harder for him to

breathe. In fact, throughout his life, Jesus experienced how it feels for a body to fail. He knows how it feels to die. When we are sick and suffering, we can turn to him for a cure, or the grace and strength to accept his will. All we have to do is ask.

Testament, the Ark
of the Covenant was
covered in blue (or
"violet") fabric for
traveling (Numbers
4:5-6). God's Presence
would "rest" on the Ark
as a king sits on his throne
(Exodus 25:22).

When Mary agreed to be the Mother of Jesus (i.e. God), she became his living "resting place." In art, Mary's blue mantle signals she is the new Ark of the Covenant.

Blue also indicates Mary's royal status. Jesus is the King of Heaven making Mary the Queen Mother. In Biblical times, the mother (not the wife) of the king was the queen. She wasn't as powerful as the king, but her intercession with him had significant influence.

Mary is not God, but her intercessory prayers for us are powerful because she is Jesus' mother. When we consider that Mary is also our mother by grace, her blue mantle invites us to entrust our concerns to her. Rather than an obstacle to Jesus, Mary leads us directly to him by a sure, safe path.

Feasts & 棋 💿 Celebrations

May 12 – Sts. Nereus and Achilleus (1st century). Not much is known about them, but it is certain they were Roman soldiers under the Emperor Trajan. They converted to Christianity, were exiled from Rome, and eventually martyred.

May 14 – St. Matthias the Apostle (1st century). Chosen by lot to replace Judas Iscariot, St. Matthias is only mentioned once in Scripture, but had accompanied Jesus and the Twelve from the beginning. He spent his life preaching the Good News until his martyrdom. May 18 - Pope St. John I (526). Born in Tuscany, Italy, John was elected pope in 523 while a deacon. His visit to Constantinople restored peace with the Eastern Church yet raised political suspicions. Arrested by King Theodoric, he died in prison.

May 21 – Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord (1st century). This solemnity marks the completion of Jesus' mission of salvation and his triumphant entry into Heaven. Note: In many dioceses,
